

The Issues: Why you should VOTE

AFFORDABLE HOUSING

An estimated 8 million Americans were experiencing homelessness before COVID-19. In Minnesota, 10,000 families and individuals mostly African Americans and Youth are unsheltered on any given night. A growing number of Seniors also experience homelessness. Low affordable housing stock, discrimination, and growing income disparities exacerbate the issue. Since COVID-19, over 1 million Americans have filed for unemployment. Despite eviction moratoriums, thousands will stil Iface eviction. More affordable housing, subsidies and/or rent control, are needed."

AFFORDABLE HEALTHCARE

Over 30 million Americans are uninsured. Disproportionately low-income Latinos, persons under age 35, and undocumented families are least likely to be insured. Currently, multiple groups pay for healthcare including private health insurance companies, employers, and the government, through programs like Medicare and Medicaid. Single-payer systems, similar to models in Canada and the UK, mean taxes would cover health expenses for all. High premiums and prescription drug costs are also a factor.

THE ENVIRONMENT

Environmental destruction caused by humans is a global, onoing problem. Earth is our only home. Humans have to be mindful of our impact on the environment including air pollution, water and soil pollution, and explore our consumption and waste management efforts. While large corporations and negligent government regulations (or lack there of) are often blamed for environmental impacts, humans drive demand through consumption - food, travel, energy usage and more. These things are affecting global warming, reduction of the ozone layer, melting the glaciers and changing the structure of air quality. Environmental Justice has grown since the 1900s with more government agencies, recognizing the need to put systems and protections in place to protect the future sustainability of the planet. Many cities, counties and states are creating Green plans to try to counteract negative impacts, while preparing for future sustainability.

JUSTICE REFORM

70% of America's jails and juvenile detention centers are disproportionately filled with African American males. Discriminatory policing, sentencing and the bail bond system has left Black families broken and bankrupted. According to the Innocence Project, approximately 10% - 230,000 people - are wrongfully convicted of crimes. That also means they're not votmg. In 2018, the initiative exonerated over 340 people - 20 on death row. America has the world's highest number of prisons and prisoners. Advocacy groups call for bail and sentencing reform. Police reform, including the adoption of holistic restorative justice practices; eliminating private prisons and decriminalizing marijuana, are also promoted.

WOMEN'S REPRODUCTIVE RIGHTS

Roe v. Wade, 410 U.S.113 (1973),was a landmark decision of the U.S. Supreme Court in which the Court ruled that the Constitution of the United States conferred the right to have an abortion. On June 24, 2022, the Supreme Court overruled Roe in Dobbs v. Jackson Women's Health Organization on the grounds that the substantive right to abortion was not "deeply rooted in this Nation's history or tradition," nor considered a right when the Due Process Clause was ratified in 1868, and was unknown in U.S. law until Roe. This reversal is an impingement of women's right to choose when, and under what circumstances. It intrudes on a Woman's personal agency and self-determination impacting her overall socioeconomic well-being and health. In the Upper Midwest, Illinois and Minnesota Governors have vowedt o protect abortion rights, while women seeking abortions in Wisconsin or The Dakotas are forced to travel out of state. This will be a determining factor in the 2022 and 2024 elections, unless efforts are successful in codifying Roe v. Wade into law."

The Women are HERE! The road to 2024...the short and long of it

Since our inception in 2015, we could see the future...and it was WOMAN! The 2023 races see an unprecedented number of women running for city council and school board - on both sides of the river - and throughout Greater Minnesota. This should come as no surprise what with the gender pay gap, the reversal of Roe v. Wade, Affirmative Action...the attack on a Black Women-led venture capital firm:))

Women and families are still reeling from post-pandemic effects: high food costs, high rents, lack of affordable housing stock. Women and Millenials are also seeking a more flexible work-life balance, affordable healthcare and access to capital. Following the mass exodus during COVID-19, employers are vying for a mass return to the workplace. Even with hiring bonuses, flex time and other enticements, response is met with a slow clap at best. The return to 'normal' is not going quite as planned.

So here's what's happening...

More than half of all St. Paul city council wards include women candidates. The heated Ward 1 race includes all newcomers, including Anika Bowie and Omar Syed. In a historic twist, there are no incumbents in wards 3, 5 and 7. This could lead to a dramatic shift of power on the council.

In Minneapolis, Ward 8 Incumbent, Andrea Jenkins, faces a few challengers. Wards 12 and 7 are newcomer races, with no incumbent. The Ward 7 race is one to watch as the outgoing council member, Lisa Goodman, has served for 25 years.

Around the state, women - Black Women and Women of Color - are stepping up and in the race! From School board races in Duluth, Hopkins/Minnetonka, St. Paul; to mayoral candidates in the outer ring suburbs of Bloomington, St. Louis Park, Golden Valley and Minnetonka, we expect this to be a trend that becomes the standard going forward.

Tax levies, property tax increases, managing legalized cannabis, ongoing government infrastructure framing, public safety and violence prevention, economic development, opioid crisis management, are just some of what you are voting on this cycle. The results of these local municipal races can, and will, affect you and your family in the immediate. They will certainly inform the 2024 presidential race. Think short and long game before heading to the polls. As always, do your homework, make an informed decision and VOTE.

Redistricting and the 'Kahn Rule'

Due to a change in state statute over a decade ago, which was further solidified by Minneapolis voters via referendum in the 2020 General Election, Minneapolis City Council Member term lengths changed from regular four-year terms to irregular two-year and four-year terms. The change in statute is commonly referred to as the "Kahn Rule." That is because former Minnesota State Representative Phyllis Kahn, in 2010, introduced legislation aimed at elections in Minneapolis though also has implications for St. Paul.

This legislative change, which was overwhelmingly approved in both the MN House and Senate, effectively decoupled the city council election from the mayoral election on the ballot thus elections are held more often in Minneapolis. City council members served a two-year term in 2021 and will serve another two-year term following the election on November 7, 2023 (with the official new term beginning in the new year 2024) The city council and mayor will be rejoined on the ballot for voters in the 2025 election. The results will determine who is elected to serve as mayor and city council in Minneapolis over the next four years together.

The intention behind the 'Kahn Rule' was to improve the electoral process as it relates to redistricting. Redistricting is a mandatory process of redrawing the boundaries of election districts to ensure equal population density after population change. Redistricting is based on data from the decennial Census count, which was last held in 2020. The process of the census count and redistricting ensued over the next two years, and while the new boundaries took effect in March of 2022, voters will have the opportunity to elect their city council representative in their newly drawn districts in this year's General Election. Election Day is November 7, 2023, but early voting in Minneapolis commenced on September 22 nd.

Had the 'Kahn Rule' not been in place, voters would have had to wait until 2025 to vote in their newly drawn districts. Consequently, some voters, whose ward or district boundaries changed, would have been displaced from the previous electoral process that resulted in their current elected official for an additional two years.

Key takeaway from redistricting: congressional, state, city, and park districts, as well as precincts and voting poll locations, may have changed. Know your voting poll location before you show up!

St. Paul city council members will serve another four-year term. St. Paul elections were already staggered between the council and mayor. The change in statute, known as the 'Kahn Rule,' doesn't appear to impact St. Paul elections until after the 2030 Census. Be prepared to vote more often!

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Spotlight on DULUTH:

Classie Dudley, President of the NAACP - Duluth



Duluth is a beautiful, idyllic port town that sits on Lake Superior. Top employers in the region include Essentia Health, Target and AGCO, an agricultural machinery manufacturing company. The 2020 Census puts Duluth's population at 86,372, with 4.8% representing 2 or more races, and 2.6% African American, or, 2,057.

The ghosts of Duluth's past hang over the city. The Clayton - Jackson - McGhie Memorial - steps from an emergent financial and social district - is an ominous reminder of the atrocius lynching of 3 Black circus

workers in 1920. Today, racially-motivated crimes against Blacks are reported on a fairly consistent basis - even as recent as September 2023. A Black woman was severely beaten by 2 white men. Many more Black and Indigenous women are reported missing.

"Race is an indicator of all issues, implicitly or explicitly." Says Classie, who wants to have a safe place for Duluth's Black community.

Classie Dudley was born and raised in Duluth. She is the President of the Duluth chapter of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP) - the largest chapter in Minnesota boasting a membership of roughly one thousand. Having grown up in Duluth, Classie faced the issues, firsthand, alongside her peers and community. It's what inspired her to lead the organization today: to truly be a part of change.

While Classie believes political leaders should come to the community to hear their concerns, she also believes the Black community needs to hold those leaders accountable. She believes the city council can do a lot more.

"City Council often says it's about equity, (but) with no backing."

Wasting no time in her new role as President, they developed a strategic plan, instituted committees around criminal justice, health and environment, education, and economics. Classie is seeing the same data in Duluth as in Minneapolis, North Dakota, South Dakota, and around the nation. "Disparities are still there."

For example, the NAACP found that, despite Black students making up less than six percent of the student body, they received more than one third of tickets issued by school resource officers (SROs). 90 tickets were given at a predominantly Black school. Classie and her partners took action and made policy changes. This year, that number dropped to 28 tickets given at that same school.

"The school board race is important," she continues. "There are currently 3 - 4 open school board seats right now. It's imperative that we get people in those seats. We need better leaders."
